



A Guide for your Christian Life between Sundays

*The Seventh Sunday of Easter
May 24 through May 30, 2020*

Our Lord, before His Passion, renders the greatest of His prayers known to us in the Gospels: what we call the 'High Priestly Prayer.' He prays that the Father may be glorified in His Passion, and that by His redemptive work, the Church may be brought into union with God. In this prayer, Christ prays that all the brokenness of this tormented world be brought together and unified in Himself, healed and made whole, that we might be saved.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – MAY 24, 2020

Theme: In Christ, all things are made whole.

Hymn: 512, “At the Name of Jesus”

Summary of Readings:

Acts 1:12–26: The Apostles, having lost Judas, choose a replacement for him to further the ministry of the Word of God: Matthias.

1 Peter 4:12–19; 5:6–11: St. Peter encourages the Church to suffer all torment in joy, knowing that in so suffering, they become imitators of Christ, and warns them against the ever present temptations of the devil.

John 17:1–11: The Lord prays to the Father for the salvation of the Church, and for its unity within itself, and with the Father through Christ.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

1 John 4:9: “In this the love of God was manifested toward us, that God has sent His only begotten Son into the world, that we might live through Him.”

THE CATECHISM: THE LORD'S PRAYER: FIRST PETITION I

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

Hallowed be Thy name.

What does this mean? God's name is certainly holy in itself, but we pray in this petition that it may be kept holy among us also.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 68:1-10 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹God shall arise, his enemies shall be scattered; and those who hate him shall flee before him! ²As smoke is driven away, so you shall drive them away; as wax melts before fire, so the wicked shall perish before God! ³But the righteous shall be glad; they shall exult before God; they shall be jubilant with joy! ⁴Sing to God, sing praises to his name; lift up a song to him who rides through the deserts; his name is the LORD; exult before him! ⁵Father of the fatherless and protector of widows is God in his holy habitation. ⁶God settles the solitary in a home; he leads out the prisoners to prosperity, but the rebellious dwell in a parched land. ⁷O God, when you went out before your people, when you marched through the wilderness, ⁸the earth quaked, the heavens poured down rain, before God, the One of Sinai, before God, the God of Israel. ⁹Rain in abundance, O God, you shed abroad; you restored your inheritance as it languished; ¹⁰your flock found a dwelling in it; in your goodness, O God, you provided for the needy.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 68¹:

Glory and praise and honor belong to You, Lamb of God, because You were slain and have redeemed us to God by Your blood, and have led our captivity captive. Pour out Your Spirit upon the dry soil of our hearts that He may cause faith and love to spring up in them and to bring fruit unto eternal life. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER:

O King of glory, Lord of hosts, uplifted in triumph far above all heavens, leave us not without consolation but send us the Spirit of truth whom You promised from the Father; for You live and reign with Him and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Monday: Pray for faith to live in the promises of Holy Baptism; for one's calling and daily work; for the unemployed; for the salvation and well-being of our neighbors; for schools, colleges, and seminaries; for good government and for peace.

Wednesday: Pray for marriage and family, that husbands and wives, parents and children live in ordered harmony according to the Word of God; for parents who must raise children alone; for our communities and neighborhoods.

Thursday: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
