In this classic work, Restout translates the traditional imagery of Pentecost iconography into what would be considered contemporary realist art. While depicting the scene in what could be considered realistic, or even hyper-realistic style, all the elements of the old Greek church art of the late Classical period and the Early Middle Ages is present: the light from above, representing the descent of the Holy Spirit; the Twelve Apostles, shocked, yet seated, representing their 'seat of authority' from which they will teach God's word; and Mary, the Mother of God, centered in the scene, in a position of glorifying prayer, herself a symbol of the Church, which shall stand throughout all ages. Mary, along with some of the Apostles are shown to be placed upon what obviously appears to be an altar. This is to show the unity of the Church (Mary), the preaching of the Word (the Apostles), and the Sacraments (the altar) in the life of the Christian who has received the Spirit first delivered on Pentecost to all who believe.



Living Man

Pastor Fields

St. Irenaeus once wrote: 'The glory of God is the living man.' It is a strange saying, for why should God's glory be connected to man at all?

In the month of May we observe the most holy feast of the Ascension of Our Lord. Historically, this day was considered to be as highly celebrated as both Christmas and Easter. However, our current culture does not attribute to the Ascension the same degree of deference. Yet, let us who are of the Church understand the importance of the Ascension, and why it is considered the last of the acts of the Son being made Man.

Generally, when we speak of God the Son being made man, as is confessed in the Creed, we think of it as a direct reference to Christmas, that is, to the incarnation and birth of Christ. This is not wrong, but it is not entirely right either. It is worthy of note that when the Creed confesses Christ's incarnation, it does not give a time or date in the same way that it does with His crucifixion or resurrection, wherein it is written 'and He was crucified under Pontius Pilate' as well as 'and on the third day, He rose. 'This is because these two following acts of Christ, His death and resurrection, are not considered something that happened after He was made man, but as part of His being made man.

In His conception and birth, the Son took on human flesh and nature, and therefore came to share in our physical existence. In His death and burial, God shared took on our sin and shared in our death. In His resurrection, He both accomplishes and is the first to enjoy the ancient promises of God given to humanity, the promises of forgiveness, life, and salvation.

This brings us to the final act of Christ becoming man, His ascension into heaven. For remember, man made in the garden by God was not made to merely dwell eternally tending to shrubs and herbs. Rather, Eden was Adam's cathedral, Tree of Life his altar, and like any altar in any Church, it leads to back to God.

As has been discussed before, the final cause, the eternal purpose and goal of man was never merely to enjoy a sinless earthly existence, but to be made *partakers of the divine nature*, as St. Peter writes in his epistle, and to become conformed to *the heavenly man*.










Spring Cleaning

Many people have heard of the custom of 'spring cleaning'.

What few people know is that it is, in fact, a Christian religious custom that arose from a desire to have the home as clean as possible for the Feast of The Resurrection of Our Lord (more commonly known as Easter).

In ancient times, during Holy Week, usually beginning on the afternoon of Palm Sunday, all the articles of the house would be taken outside to be exposed to 'living air', and the house would be scrubbed clean: floors. walls, and all. The household items and furniture would also be cleaned outdoors, and then be returned inside to their proper place. This was all in preparation for the eating of a whole lamb by the family which took place on Easter Day. Such cleaning and preparation were considered necessary, since in former times, Easter dinner was considered not so much just another big meal on a holiday, but a religious feast, filled with a mix of prayer and revelry, much similar to the Passover dinners held today by observant Jews. It was also

a day to celebrate those newly baptized and confirmed, and to welcome them into the full life of the Church, filled as it is with both solemnity and rejoicing, since such sacred rites and sacraments took play on Easter Saturday, the night before.

In the countries farther north, such as Germany, Latvia, or Norway, where Easter usually fell on a day during a time when snow was still falling, and the air was much too frigid to wash anything, people were generally baptized or confirmed on the Feast of Pentecost, instead of Easter. when it was warmer; and so Spring Cleaning as well was moved to the week prior to Pentecost, during the last of the fifty days of Easter.

So, if the house needs cleaning, and the weather is pleasant, you too can engage in the very ancient (and very sanitary!) tradition of Spring Cleaning; and once your house is glimmering, invite a few friends over for dinner, and celebrate the great work of Our Lord.



God Strengthens His Church during CV-19

For the first time, services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Saturday's Easter Vigil were held for everyone. Usually each location gets one or two Holy Week services. Because of COVID-19, we could not do this. Instead, the pastors worked together to provide all the Holy Week services to everyone via the internet. While we wait for Sunday school to start again...



tradition that, since God promised through Simeon that Mary would endure the greatest suffering in watching the woeful Passion of her Son, it was only proper that she also behold the greatest glorification of her Son in His Ascension. However, the more important, and indeed, true reason for her presence is that she represents the Church as a whole. The fact that she is flanked by angels on either side represents the 'angels and archangels and all the company of heaven' present during the Lord's Supper, and her extended hands represent the eternal prayer of the Liturgy.

Ancient icons depicting Pentecost have several themes in common. A fiery dove representing the Holy Spirit takes the place of Christ in the skies. Beneath again are the Twelve, with Mary once more in the middle, representing the Church. Yet instead of being standing, the Apostles, along with Mary, are seated, the pose assumed in ancient times when one was preaching (instead of having a pulpit, churches of the first centuries of Christianity had a bema, that is, a raised surface with chairs from which the clergy would read the Gospel and teach).









A final aspect present in most variations on the Pentecost iconographical theme is a background of darkened buildings, representing the unenlightened world into which the Gospel must be preached.

Passing from the icon of the Ascension to that of Pentecost, we see dual aspect of the life of the Church, the one being of the saints beholding and contemplating their risen Lord, eternally praying to Him, the other being the mission to teach and bear witness to the salvation won for us by the victory of Christ over death. ■

Therefore, Christ completes His becoming man by taking His human nature into the presence of the God of Life, to join human nature to that perfect communion with the Blessed Trinity for which it was always destined. In the Ascension, human nature in Christ comes to completion, Christ himself is made fully man insofar as his humanity now becomes fully God; He becomes 'the living man,' the Man who is united to Life


itself. This is the blessedness towards which the Church ever walks, and which awaits us on the o3ther side of the veil of toothless death. In the Ascension, this is revealed to us; and in seeing that we too are united to Life Himself, that we too shall become 'living men,' the glory of the Lord is revealed in the completion of His loving will to bring all His saints into unity with Himself. ■
