*The Fourth Sunday after Pentecost
June 28 through July 4, 2020*

Christ says '*I have not come to bring peace, but a sword.*' This is a troubling thing for us Christians, for we know that we must *love our neighbors as ourselves*. We do not like hearing of Jesus bringing a sword, of setting people against each other. But the Lord takes up the sword because in this fallen world, filled with fallen men, ruled by a fallen angel, things are not solved with mere words, but with the shedding of blood. Therefore Christ comes to shed His blood by the sword, that He may descend into hell with the sword to slay our ancient foe, that we may be saved.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – JUNE 28, 2020

Theme: By the shedding of Christ’s blood, we are forgiven, and by His death, He is conquers the powers of hell.

Hymn: 454, “Sing, My Tongue, the Glorious Battle”

Summary of Readings:

Jeremiah 28:5–9: Jeremiah prophesies about the eventual return of Israel from Babylon to the Holy Land, yet he warns that the way will not be easy; that God’s people will have to endure still more trials before they come to peace.

Romans 7:1–13: St. Paul teaches the Church that, though the Law reveals sin, and therefore condemns sin, it is not itself evil; rather sin is evil. Therefore, we who no longer live under the Law’s condemnation, are free to live into the righteousness revealed in the Law.

Matthew 10:34–42: Christ speaks to His disciples about the trials that shall befall them for His name’s sake, but encourages them that whoever holds fast to Him unto the end will be saved.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Romans 8:18: “I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed to us.”

THE CATECHISM: THE LORD'S PRAYER: THIRD PETITION II

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

How is God's will done? God's will is done when He breaks and hinders every evil plan and purpose of the devil, the world, and our sinful nature, which do not want us to hallow God's name or let His kingdom come; and when He strengthens and keeps us firm in His Word and faith until we die. This is His good and gracious will.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 119:153-160 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹⁵³Look on my affliction and deliver me, for I do not forget your law.

¹⁵⁴Plead my cause and redeem me; give me life according to your promise!

¹⁵⁵Salvation is far from the wicked, for they do not seek your statutes.

¹⁵⁶Great is your mercy, O LORD; give me life according to your rules.

¹⁵⁷Many are my persecutors and my adversaries, but I do not swerve from your testimonies.

¹⁵⁸I look at the faithless with disgust, because they do not keep your commands.

¹⁵⁹Consider how I love your precepts! Give me life according to your steadfast love.

¹⁶⁰The sum of your word is truth, and every one of your righteous rules endures forever.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 119:153-160¹:

Lord, our God, who has commanded us to pray, grant us that Spirit of prayer, who alone can teach us how to bring our petitions before You in acceptable manner. Cause Your Spirit to guide us, that we seek not self-chosen works after our own thoughts, but continue in Your Word that we may be found Your children indeed. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Almighty God, by the working of Your Holy Spirit, grant that we may gladly hear Your Word proclaimed among us and follow its directing; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
