Even when we do not feel the presence of God, yet we are assured by His promises in Scripture, that He will return to us. Zechariah prophesied to a forlorn people who had just returned from exile, that the Lord would come to them in the building of the Temple. So shall He, when He does not seem near, return to us in our exile in the lost land of this life.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – JULY 5, 2020

Theme: The Lord shall return.

Hymn: 348, “The King Shall Come When Morning Dawns”

Summary of Readings:

Zechariah 9:9–12: God promises the return of His presence to the Temple in Jerusalem, and brings His people back to Him from Exile.

Romans 7:14–25: We do the evil that we would not do, and do not do the good that we would do. This is the misery of living in our sinful flesh. But Christ delivers us from this all.

Matthew 11:25–30: Christ has declared His grace and forgiveness, not to the enlightened, but to commoners and simple people, that He might put pride to shame, and raise up the lowly.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Romans 1:16: “I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for all who believe.”

THE CATECHISM: THE LORD’S PRAYER: FOURTH PETITION I

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean? God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 145:1-14 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹I will extol you, my God and King, and bless your name forever and ever. ²Every day I will bless you and praise your name forever and ever. ³Great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised, and his greatness is unsearchable. ⁴One generation shall commend your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts. ⁵On the glorious splendor of your majesty, and on your wondrous works, I will meditate. ⁶They shall speak of the might of your awesome deeds, and I will declare your greatness. ⁷They shall pour forth the fame of your abundant goodness and shall sing aloud of your righteousness. ⁸The LORD is gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. ⁹The LORD is good to all, and his mercy is over all that he has made. ¹⁰All your works shall give thanks to you, O LORD, and all your saints shall bless you! ¹¹They shall speak of the glory of your kingdom and tell of your power, ¹²to make known to the children of man your mighty deeds, and the glorious splendor of your kingdom. ¹³Your kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and your dominion endures throughout all generations. [The LORD is faithful in all his words and kind in all his works.] ¹⁴The LORD upholds all who are falling and raises up all who are bowed down.

LUTHER’S PRAYER ON PSALM 145¹:

Lord Jesus, my salvation, my light, my life divine, my only consolation, O make me wholly Thine! For Thou hast dearly bought me with blood and bitter pain. Let me, since Thou hast sought me, eternal life obtain. Amen. (LSB 689:2)

COLLECT FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Gracious God, our heavenly Father, Your mercy attends us all our days. Be our strength and support amid the wearisome changes of this world, and at life’s end grant us Your promised rest and the full joys of Your salvation; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Thursday: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
