August 9 through August 15, 2020*

Our Lord sends away His disciples that He might ascend the mountain to pray. This is a type of what is to come, when His disciples will forsake Him, and He shall go up mount Golgotha, there to pray to His Father that we might be forgiven of our sins. Jesus is ever upon this mountain, ever praying, that we might be forgiven. Therefore, when we lack faith, when we lack hope, when we lack love, let us do as St. Peter, and call upon the Lord, that He Who forever prays for us might reach down to us, and bring us to salvation.

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – AUGUST 9, 2020

Theme: The Lord Christ forever prays to His Father for our salvation.

Hymn: 564, “Christ Sits at God’s Right Hand”

Summary of Readings:

Isaiah 56:1, 6–8: The Lord promises that He will draw all nations into Israel, that all might keep His Sabbath, that is, that all might enjoy His rest.

Romans 10:5–17: St. Paul teaches that God shows no partiality between nations and peoples, but shall save all who call upon His holy name in repentance and faith.

Matthew 14:22–33: Christ walks upon the sea, and invites St. Peter to walk with him, and St. Peter, as he sinks into the sea for lack of faith, is rescued by Christ.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Acts 14:22: “Continue in the faith. We must through many tribulations enter the kingdom of God.”

THE CATECHISM: THE LORD’S PRAYER: CONCLUSION

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

For Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

What does this mean? This means that I should be certain that these petitions are pleasing to our Father in heaven, and are heard by Him; for He Himself has commanded us to pray in this way and has promised to hear us. Amen, amen means “yes, yes, it shall be so.”

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 18:1-6 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹I love you, O LORD, my strength. ²The LORD is my rock and my fortress and my deliverer, my God, my rock, in whom I take refuge, my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold. ³I call upon the LORD, who is worthy to be praised, and I am saved from my enemies. ⁴The cords of death encompassed me; the torrents of destruction assailed me; ⁵the cords of Sheol entangled me; the snares of death confronted me. ⁶In my distress I called upon the LORD; to my God I cried for help. From his temple he heard my voice, and my cry to him reached his ears.

LUTHER’S PRAYER ON PSALM 18¹:

Praise, honor, and thanksgiving do we offer unto You, O Father of lights, from whom comes every good and every perfect gift, because You daily preserve us from many evils, guard us in many dangers, crown us with many blessings, enable our hearts to appreciate Your goodness, and to rejoice before You, through Jesus Christ, our Savior. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE TENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Almighty and most merciful God, preserve us from all harm and danger that we, being ready in both body and soul, may cheerfully accomplish what You want done; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
