The Second Sunday of Christmas January 3 through January 9, 2021

People have been willing to sacrifice everything from money to human lives for any number of petty purposes for the history of all mankind. In the past century, we have seen more 'human sacrifice' for the sake of human ideals than in any age of the past, and all this we think of as just a chapter in history. Yet we balk at the idea of the sacrifice of animals in the Old Testament, and the sacrifice of the Son in the New. But there is one, and only one sacrifice that is needful, that of the Christ Child, who has been born to us.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – JANUARY 3, 2021

Theme: There is but one sacrifice needful to us, for our forgiveness and redemption: that of the Son of the Father.

Hymn: 370, "What Child Is This"

Summary of Readings:

1 Kings 3:4–15: The Lord comes to King Solomon in a dream, granting him whatsoever wish he desires. King Solomon asks for wisdom and understanding. The Lord is greatly pleased at this request, and grants it to Solomon.

Ephesians 1:3–14: St. Paul teaches of our election in Christ, and that how in Christ, we have received redemption through Him, and a great inheritance.

Luke 2:40–52: Jesus is lost by His parents in Jerusalem, and when they return to look for Him, they find Him in the Temple, listening to the teachings of the rabbis. When asked why He was there by His parents, He responds that He must be in His Father's house.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

John 1:14: "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth."

THE CATECHISM: THE TENTH COMMANDMENT

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the Tenth Commandment? You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not entice or force away our neighbor's wife, workers, or animals, or turn them against him, but urge them to stay and do their duty.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 119:97-104 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

⁹⁷Oh how I love your law! It is my meditation all the day. ⁹⁸Your commandment makes me wiser than my enemies, for it is ever with me. ⁹⁹I have more understanding than all my teachers, for your testimonies are my meditation. ¹⁰⁰I understand more than the aged, for I keep your precepts. ¹⁰I hold back my feet from every evil way, in order to keep your word. ¹⁰²I do not turn aside from your rules, for you have taught me. ¹⁰³How sweet are your words to my taste, sweeter than honey to my mouth! ¹⁰⁴Through your precepts I get understanding; therefore I hate every false way.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 119:97-1041:

Thanks be to You, God of all wisdom, that You have given us Your Word, in which You teach us the true wisdom. Guard us from the seductions of science falsely so called, and keep us in the faith of Your Word, which enlightens the soul unto eternal life. So draw us to Your Son, that we hear His voice and follow Him. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS:

Almighty God, You have poured into our hearts the true Light of Your incarnate Word. Grant that this Light may shine forth in our lives; through the same Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

- <u>Sunday</u>: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

- <u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.
- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
