A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – FEBRUARY 28, 2021

Theme: Christians believe in a God who suffers for them.

Hymn: 419, “Savior, When in Dust to Thee”

Summary of Readings:

Genesis 17:1–7: God makes His covenant with Abram, and renames him Abraham.

Romans 5:1–11: St. Paul explains with great clarity that we are justified through faith, by the grace of God, won by Our Lord Jesus Christ, apart from any merit of our own.

Mark 8:27–38: St. Peter makes his great confession: ‘You are the Christ.’ Yet soon after, he forbids Jesus to die for our salvation. Our Lord replies, ‘Get behind me, Satan.’ For Our Lord knows that the Son of Man must suffer if we are to be saved.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Romans 5:8: “God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.”

THE CATECHISM: THE APOSTLE'S CREED: THIRD ARTICLE

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What does this mean? I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith.

In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian Church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith.

In this Christian Church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers.

On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ.

This is most certainly true.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 22:23-31 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

²³You who fear the LORD, praise him! All you offspring of Jacob, glorify him, and stand in awe of him, all you offspring of Israel! ²⁴For he has not despised or abhorred the affliction of the afflicted, and he has not hidden his face from him, but has heard, when he cried to him.

²⁵From you comes my praise in the great congregation; my vows I will perform before those who fear him. ²⁶The afflicted shall eat and be satisfied; those who seek him shall praise the LORD! May your hearts live forever! ²⁷All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD, and all the families of the nations shall worship before you. ²⁸For kingship belongs to the LORD, and he rules over the nations. ²⁹All the prosperous of the earth eat and worship; before him shall bow all who go down to the dust, even the one who could not keep himself alive. ³⁰Posterity shall serve him; it shall be told of the Lord to the coming generation; ³¹they shall come and proclaim his righteousness to a people yet unborn, that he has done it.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 22¹:

Merciful and kind are You, O Lord of hosts, because You have sent the Gospel of Your Son to us Gentiles. Our fathers went to worship idols as they were led, but to us, their children, You have sent the light, though we deserved it not. Cause it to dwell richly with our children and us, and by Your Spirit make it to grow in our hearts and bring fruit unto eternal life. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT:

O God, You see that of ourselves we have no strength. By Your mighty power defend us from all adversities that may happen to the body and from all evil thoughts that may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Thursday: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.

Luther's Morning Prayer:
