

The Ninth Sunday after Pentecost July 25 through July 31, 2021

The sea has always represented the chaotic, uncaring, even evil forces of the world. Billowed up by winds, it consumed and drowns all men who dare to go too far into it. Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

DAILY READINGS FOR THE WEEK

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY - JULY 25, 2021

Theme: Though we are tested in this life in many and various ways, Christ holds the victory over all such demonic temptations and comes to us in our time of need.

Hymn: 763, "When Peace, Like a River"

Summary of Readings:

Genesis 9:8–17: God makes His covenant with Noah by the rainbow, that never again will He destroy mankind by the waters.

Ephesians 3:14–21: St. Paul encourages the Church, reminding us of the infinite depth of the love of God, which we are recipients of through faith.

Mark 6:45–56: After feeding the five-thousand, Christ commands His disciples to cross the sea by themselves. Yet when they are troubled upon the sea, He comes to them, and comforts them, and brings them safely to the other side.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Ephesians 3:17-19: "That Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith—that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

THE CATECHISM: OFFICE OF THE KEYS (PART I)

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the Office of the Keys? The Office of the Keys is that special authority which Christ has given to His Church on earth to forgive the sins of repentant sinners, but to withhold forgiveness from the unrepentant as long as they do not repent.

Where is this written? This is what St. John the Evangelist writes in chapter twenty: The Lord Jesus breathed on His disciples and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven" (John 20:22-23).

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 136:1-9 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever. ²Give thanks to the God of gods, for his steadfast love endures forever. ³Give thanks to the Lord of lords, for his steadfast love endures forever; ⁴to him who alone does great wonders, for his steadfast love endures forever; ⁵to him who by understanding made the heavens, for his steadfast love endures forever; ⁶to him who spread out the earth above the waters, for his steadfast love endures forever; ⁷to him who made the great lights, for his steadfast love endures forever; ⁸the sun to rule over the day, for his steadfast love endures forever.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 136¹:

My Father, God of mercy and truth, to Your mercy do I look for deliverance from sin and death. Your mercy will I plead before Your judgment seat. Your mercy will I sing all the days of my life. Have mercy upon us, and forgive us our transgressions, for the sake of Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Savior. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE NINTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Almighty and most merciful God, the protector of all who trust in You, strengthen our faith and give us courage to believe that in Your love You will rescue us from all adversities; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
