

A Guide for your Christian Life between Sundays

The Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost August 22 through August 28, 2021

Our Lord shows the idolatry innate in the human heart, where we do not follow the commandments of God, but rather manufacture moralities of our own, moralities that, like physical idols, can be seen by others when we act them out, that we might win praise and admiration. Our Lord has come to abolish all such human traditions, that we might face the Law of God directly, stand accused of our ungodliness, and so receive the Gospel of Grace with full contrition, being saved by Christ alone, through His Passion, bloody sweat—His sacrificial death and Resurrection.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY - AUGUST 22, 2021

Theme: Man's idolatrous heart creates traditions to replace the requirements of the Law of God. Christ has come to relieve humanity of this idolatry.

Hymn: 608, "Lord, to You I Make Confession"

Summary of Readings:

Isaiah 29:11–19: God condemns the hypocrisy of His people, and promises to break them of their false worship. However, He then promises them redemption by His grace.

Ephesians 5:22–33: St. Paul instructs Christian husbands and wives how they are to relate to one another, and how they, in their love for one another, become a living image of Christ and His Church.

Mark 7:1–13: Jesus and His disciples are accused of sacrilege by the Pharisees. Jesus rebukes them for caring more about the novel moralities invented by men than the Law of God given by Moses.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Psalm 73:26: "My flesh and my heart fail; But God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever."

THE CATECHISM: THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR III

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the benefit of this eating and drinking? These words, "Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins," show us that in the Sacrament forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation are given us through these words. For where there is forgiveness of sins, there is life and salvation.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 14 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹The fool says in his heart, "There is no God." They are corrupt, they do abominable deeds; there is none who does good. ²The LORD looks down from heaven on the children of man, to see if there are any who understand, who seek after God. ³They have all turned aside; together they have become corrupt; there is none who does good, not even one. ⁴Have they no knowledge, all the evildoers who eat up my people as they eat bread and do not call upon the LORD? ⁵There they are in great terror, for God is with the generation of the righteous. ⁶You would shame the plans of the poor, but the LORD is his refuge. ⁷Oh, that salvation for Israel would come out of Zion! When the LORD restores the fortunes of his people, let Jacob rejoice, let Israel be glad.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 14¹:

Lord, from Your throne on high look with a pitying eye upon us poor, sinful mortals. Preserve us, that we not be led astray by infidelity or superstition, and grant us simplicity of faith to receive the Gospel of Your Son, who has the words of eternal life, that in Him we may be Yours in time and eternity. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE THIRTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Almighty and merciful God, defend Your Church from all false teaching and error that Your faithful people may confess You to be the only true God and rejoice in Your good gifts of life and salvation; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

- <u>Sunday</u>: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

- <u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.
- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
