*The Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost
October 10 through October 16, 2021*

Who can actually follow Christ on His way to the cross? At least one man thinks he can, and at least one man desires to do so, that is, the rich young ruler. Yet Christ must offer his sacrifice upon Golgotha alone, and none may follow, even as the high priests of old entered the Holy of Holies once a year to sacrifice alone.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – OCTOBER 10, 2021

Theme: None may follow Christ to His sacrifice on the cross. He must offer it alone on our behalf and for our redemption.

Hymn: 450, “O Sacred Head, Now Wounded”

Summary of Readings:

Amos 5:6–7, 10–15: God commands the people to turn away from their transgressions and pursue righteousness.

Hebrews 3:12–19: The author of Hebrews enjoins the Church to not become complacent, but to be on guard against sin and heresy, lest we falter.

Mark 10:17–22: Our Lord meets the rich young ruler, and commands him to give away all that he has, and to follow Him.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Deuteronomy 6:4-5: “Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one! You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength.”

THE CATECHISM: THE NINTH COMMANDMENT

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

*What is the Ninth Commandment? **You shall not covet your neighbor's house.***

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or get it in a way which only appears right, but help and be of service to him in keeping it.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 90:12-17 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹² So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom.

¹³ Return, O LORD! How long? Have pity on your servants!

¹⁴ Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love, that we may rejoice and be glad all our days.

¹⁵ Make us glad for as many days as you have afflicted us, and for as many years as we have seen evil.

¹⁶ Let your work be shown to your servants, and your glorious power to their children.

¹⁷ Let the favor of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish the work of our hands upon us; yes, establish the work of our hands!

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 90¹:

O lord, eternal God, teach us so to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom, embracing Christ and His Gospel as Your wisdom and Your counsel for our salvation. Grant us grace to walk honestly as in the day that, when our last hour is come, we may be found in true faith and godliness, ready to appear before the judgment seat of Christ. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE TWENTIETH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Lord Jesus Christ, whose grace always precedes and follows us, help us to forsake all trust in earthly gain and to find in You our heavenly treasure; for You live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Thursday: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
