DAILY READINGS FOR THE WEEK

LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY - MAY 22, 2022

Theme: What God ordains is always right, whether we understand it or not.

Hymn: 758 "The Will of God Is Always Best"

Summary of Readings:

Acts 16:9–15: St. Paul receives a vision to go to Macedonia, and with his companions, he does so. There he baptizes Lydia, a wealthy merchant, and receives her hospitality.

Revelation 21:9-14, 21-27: An angel reveals to St. John the heavenly Jerusalem, in all its glory, and describes it. However, St. John warns that none that are unclean shall dwell within that city.

John 16:23–33: Christ promises to His disciples that in the Last Day, all that they ask shall answered of God the Father, and promises them peace in the midst of their tribulations.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

John 15:7: "If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you, you will ask what you desire, and it shall be done for you."

THE CATECHISM: THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR I

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the Sacrament of the Altar? It is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, instituted by Christ Himself for us Christians to eat and to drink.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 67 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face to shine upon us,

²that your way may be known on earth, your saving power among all nations.

³Let the peoples praise you, O God; let all the peoples praise you!

⁴Let the nations be glad and sing for joy, for you judge the peoples with equity and guide the nations upon earth.

⁵Let the peoples praise you, O God; let all the peoples praise you!

⁶The earth has yielded its increase; God, our God, shall bless us.

⁷God shall bless us; let all the ends of the earth fear him!

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 67¹:

Praise and thanks be to our God for calling us of the Gentiles into the kingdom of His dear Son, and making us partakers of His grace and salvation. May He grant us grace to walk worthy of the Gospel whereby we are called, and to serve Him in joy and gladness all our days, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER:

O God, the Giver of all that is good, by Your holy inspiration grant that we may think those things that are right and by Your merciful guiding accomplish them; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

- <u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.
- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
