June 19 through June 25, 2022*

Our God is a good God, but He is not a safe God. In His Incarnation and ministry, we see Him as a lowly and humble man; yet even in His humility His power is manifest. On that day, He shall make all the world His footstool, and all those who have been washed in the blood of the cross shall be made raised in majesty.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – JUNE 19, 2022

Theme: Christ is surely coming to judge the living and the dead.

Hymn: 849, “Praise the One Who Breaks the Darkness”

Summary of Readings:

Isaiah 65:1–9: The prophet declares that Israel has denied their God, and God promises castigation for their hatred, that they may be corrected, but ultimately promises them redemption.

Galatians 3:23—4:7: St. Paul teaches that all, being granted the faith of Christ, are equal and one, and all distinctions are nullified. All, instead, are children of God, and heirs of His kingdom.

Luke 8:26–39: Christ casts out the demons who possessed the Gesarene man. In response, the pagan Gesarenes expel Him from their presence, for they fear His power.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Acts 14:22: “Continue in the faith, we must through many tribulations enter the kingdom of God.”

THE CATECHISM: THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR V

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

Who receives this Sacrament worthily? Fasting and bodily preparation are certainly fine outward training. But that person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: “Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.” But anyone who does not believe these words or doubts them is unworthy and unprepared, for the words “for you” require all hearts to believe.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 3 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹O LORD, how many are my foes! Many are rising against me; ²many are saying of my soul, “There is no salvation for him in God.” ³But you, O LORD, are a shield about me, my glory, and the lifter of my head. ⁴I cried aloud to the LORD, and he answered me from his holy hill. ⁵I lay down and slept; I woke again, for the LORD sustained me. ⁶I will not be afraid of many thousands of people who have set themselves against me all around. ⁷Arise, O LORD! Save me, O my God! For you strike all my enemies on the cheek; you break the teeth of the wicked. ⁸Salvation belongs to the LORD; your blessing be on your people!

LUTHER’S PRAYER ON PSALM 3¹:

Lord Jesus, You were delivered for our offenses and raised again for our justification. Bless and defend Your Holy Church. Endue Your Word with power, strengthen our faith, and after the sufferings of this life grant us to celebrate a happy Easter, rising again to live and reign with You in all eternity. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, be with us as the sure defense of Your Church. Defend us against our enemies, preserve us from the persecutions of the wicked, and when our last hour has come, deliver us from all evil, both of body and soul, and receive us into Your everlasting kingdom. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
