



A Guide for your Christian Life between Sundays

*The Seventh Sunday after Pentecost
July 24 through July 30, 2022*

God created man to have dominion over the earth, yet believing that we were seeking a greater kingdom, we in fact willed our own slavery. We fell into idolatry, submitting ourselves to the very created things over which we were to rule. Yet God will not let this slavery continue, for even as He sent Moses to redeem His people from slavery in Egypt, so will He, through the incarnation of His Son, redeem us from our slavery to the idols, and in so doing, give to us His Word, that we may speak to the Father in His person.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – JULY 24, 2022

Theme: God, through His Son, redeems man from our slavery to the idols to once again rule over creation.

Hymn: 351, “Creator of the Stars of Night”

Summary of Readings:

Genesis 18:20–33: Because of their great wickedness, God will destroy Sodom and Gomorrah. Abraham intercedes on their behalf, but since there is not one innocent man in those cities, God overturns the land, giving to its inhabitants the slavery and death for which they desired.

Colossians 2:6–15: St. Paul urges the Church to be seduced neither by heresy nor by sophistry, but to cling to the victory of Christ which brings liberty from the enslaving powers of the world.

Luke 11:1–13: Our Lord teaches us His prayer, and teaches us of the goodness of our Heavenly Father, which exceeds that of any earthly father.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Genesis 1:31: “And God saw everything that He had made, and behold, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.”

THE CATECHISM: THE EIGHTH COMMANDMENT

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

*What is the Eighth Commandment? **You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.***

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 138 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹I give you thanks, O LORD, with my whole heart; before the gods I sing your praise; ²I bow down toward your holy temple and give thanks to your name for your steadfast love and your faithfulness, for you have exalted above all things your name and your word. ³On the day I called, you answered me; my strength of soul you increased. ⁴All the kings of the earth shall give you thanks, O LORD, for they have heard the words of your mouth, ⁵and they shall sing of the ways of the LORD, for great is the glory of the LORD. ⁶For though the LORD is high, he regards the lowly, but the haughty he knows from afar. ⁷Though I walk in the midst of trouble, you preserve my life; you stretch out your hand against the wrath of my enemies, and your right hand delivers me. ⁸The LORD will fulfill his purpose for me; your steadfast love, O LORD, endures forever. Do not forsake the work of your hands.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 138¹:

Renewed thanks do we return unto You, O Father of mercy, for all Your loving-kindness toward us; and chiefly, because You have called us into the kingdom of Your Son, our Savior. Cleanse us from sin by His blood, and remember not our transgressions against us. Do not forsake the work of Your own hands that, delivered from our enemies, we may evermore praise you. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

You have built Your Church on the foundation of the apostles and prophets with Christ Jesus Himself as the cornerstone. Continue to send Your messengers to preserve Your people in true peace that, by the preaching of Your Word, Your Church may be kept free from all harm and danger; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Thursday: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
