



A Guide for your Christian Life between Sundays

*The First Sunday of Advent
November 27 through December 3, 2022*

The season of Advent is named after the Latin word for ‘coming.’ Obviously, it refers to the coming of the Lord. Yet there are three ‘comings’ of which the Bible speaks. The most festive is His birth in the flesh that we celebrate on Christmas day. The second is His coming every Sunday to give us His body and blood for our salvation. Yet the ‘coming’ we read of in today’s reading is the Last Coming, when He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead. He does not demand that we be sinless, or righteous, or perfect. Rather, Jesus asks us only to be ready, for to be always ready for His coming, and joyous to greet it, is faith, hope, and love fulfilled.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – NOVEMBER 27, 2022

Theme: Let us ever be ready for the final coming of the Lord on the Last Day.

Hymn: 509, “Christ Is Surely Coming”

Summary of Readings:

Isaiah 2:1-5: The people of God come to His mountain, to the house where the LORD locates Himself in order to hear His Word and walk in the light of His salvation.

Romans 13:11-14: St. Paul reminds us that salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed. Let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, put on the armor of light, and walk as a new creation in Christ.

Matthew 24:36-44: The Lord speaks of His Second Coming, and commands all the faithful to be prepared, and to not grow weary with waiting.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Psalm 119:105: “Your word is a lamp to my feet, and a light to my path.”

THE CATECHISM: THE LORD'S PRAYER: FOURTH PETITION I

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean? God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 122 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD!"

²Our feet have been standing within your gates, O Jerusalem!

³Jerusalem- built as a city that is bound firmly together,

⁴to which the tribes go up, the tribes of the LORD, as was decreed for Israel, to give thanks to the name of the LORD.

⁵There thrones for judgment were set, the thrones of the house of David.

⁶Pray for the peace of Jerusalem! "May they be secure who love you!"

⁷Peace be within your walls and security within your towers!"

⁸For my brothers and companions' sake I will say, "Peace be within you!"

⁹For the sake of the house of the LORD our God, I will seek your good.

PRAYER ON PSALM 122¹:

Our hearts are glad and our souls rejoice before You, Lord, our God, because by Your Word of truth You have made us members of Your Holy Church, in which You daily and richly forgive the sins of all those who build their trust on Jesus Christ. Grant us grace to abide in the love of Your Word, in purity of faith and in piety of life, even to our end. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT:

Stir up Your power, O Lord, and come, that by Your protection we may be rescued from the threatening perils of our sins and saved by Your mighty deliverance; for You live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Thursday: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
