The Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord December 25 through December 31, 2022

During this Christmas season, we celebrate the Incarnation, God taking on human flesh. Yet Christian theologians have asked for centuries the question 'cur deus homo,' That is, 'why did God become man.' It is a fair question. Did He really need to? Was there not a way to save or guide or rule us that did not require Him to get involved in all the mess of our world? There are a thousand sound, biblical, scholarly answers to this question. But on this day it is enough to understand that God became man in Jesus because He good, He is our king, and He loves us.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – DECEMBER 25, 2022

Theme: God became man to fulfill the greatest of the commandments.

Hymn: 361, "O Little Town of Bethlehem"

Summary of Readings:

Isaiah 52:7–10: "All the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of God" – a promise that is fulfilled in the birth of Jesus. For that reason, we "Break forth into singing... for the LORD has comforted His people."

Hebrews 1:1–6: "The Son *is* the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of His nature, and He upholds the universe by the word of His power"! You want to see God? Look to Jesus, His Christ, "through whom also He created the world."

John 1:1–14: "In the beginning, the Word was *with* God, and the Word *was* God" – two persons, Father and Son, revealed for us by the Word who became flesh and dwelt among us. "We have seen His glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth."

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

John 1:1-3: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made."

THE CATECHISM: THE LORD'S PRAYER: SEVENTH PETITION

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

But deliver \(\frac{1}{2} \) us from evil.

What does this mean? We pray in this petition, in summary, that our Father in heaven would rescue us from every evil of body and soul, possessions and reputation, and finally, when our last hour comes, give us a blessed end, and graciously take us from this valley of sorrow to Himself in heaven

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 2 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain? ²The kings of the earth set themselves, and the rulers take counsel together, against the LORD and against his anointed, saying, ³"Let us burst their bonds apart and cast away their cords from us." ⁴He who sits in the heavens laughs; the Lord holds them in derision. ⁵Then he will speak to them in his wrath, and terrify them in his fury, saying, 6"As for me, I have set my King on Zion, my holy hill." ¹I will tell of the decree: The LORD said to me, "You are my Son; today I have begotten you. ⁸Ask of me, and I will make the nations your heritage, and the ends of the earth your possession. ⁹You shall break them with a rod of iron and dash them in pieces like a potter's vessel." ¹Now therefore, O kings, be wise; be warned, O rulers of the earth. ¹¹Serve the LORD with fear, and rejoice with trembling. ¹²Kiss the Son, lest he be angry, and you perish in the way, for his wrath is quickly kindled. Blessed are all who take refuge in him.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 21:

Thanks be unto You, O Lord Jesus Christ, because You were once dead, and by Your blood redeemed us from sin and everlasting torment. We desire to serve You all the days of our life. Preserve us in the midst of so many enemies, and by Your mighty hand preserve us for Your eternal kingdom! Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD:

Almighty God, grant that the birth of Your only-begotten Son in the flesh may set us free from the bondage of sin; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

- <u>Sunday</u>: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

- <u>Thursday</u>: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.
- <u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.
- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
