

A Guide for your Christian Life between Sundays

The First Sunday in Lent February 26 through March 4, 2023

In Adam, man fell, for we longed to be divine apart from God's will. Ever since then, we have rebelled against God's will, seeking a world of our own making. And in this fallen world which we desired, we make idols of all that has power in this world, that we might subjugate them to our own service, that we might have pride and power. This is the history of humanity. Christ, the Son of Man, has come to rewrite this history. He shall not long for divinity, but take on humanity. He shall not rebel against God's law, but fulfill it. He shall not serve the manifold idols that we create, but destroy them. In so doing, the Son of Man shall be what humanity was always meant to be. And by meekness before God, we shall once more become His image and likeness, ruling over all creation, even as Adam was intended to.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – FEBRUARY 26, 2023

Theme: In Christ's ministry, He lives the life that man was meant to live, and obeys God as man was meant to obey, that He might truly be both the Son of God and the Son of Man.

Hymn: 424, "O Christ, You Walked the Road"

Summary of Readings:

Genesis 3:1–21: Adam and Eve are tempted in the Garden of Eden by the serpent and fall into sin against God.

Romans 5:12–19: St. Paul teaches about Christ being the Second Adam, who shall accomplish what the first Adam failed to do: that is, be obedient unto God, and so rule over the world in humbleness.

Matthew 4:1–11: Our Lord is tempted in the wilderness with three trials by the devil.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Romans 5:19: "For as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous."

THE CATECHISM: OFFICE OF THE KEYS (PART I)

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the Office of the Keys? The Office of the Keys is that special authority which Christ has given to His Church on earth to forgive the sins of repentant sinners, but to withhold forgiveness from the unrepentant as long as they do not repent.

Where is this written? This is what St. John the Evangelist writes in chapter twenty: The Lord Jesus breathed on His disciples and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven" (John 20:22-23).

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 32:1-7 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered. ²Blessed is the man against whom the LORD counts no iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no deceit. ³For when I kept silent, my bones wasted away through my groaning all day long. ⁴For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer. ⁵I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity; I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD," and you forgave the iniquity of my sin. ⁶Therefore let everyone who is godly offer prayer to you at a time when you may be found; surely in the rush of great waters, they shall not reach him. ⁷You are a hiding place for me; you preserve me from trouble; you surround me with shouts of deliverance.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 321:

O God, our heavenly Father, with whom is grace and much forgiveness, be merciful to us who were born in sin and cannot but sin and fall short every day. Forgive us our many transgressions and account them against us no more, but make us Your heirs through Jesus Christ, Your beloved Son, who was delivered into death for our offenses, and was raised again for our justification. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT:

O Lord God, You led Your ancient people through the wilderness and brought them to the promised land. Guide the people of Your Church that following our Savior we may walk through the wilderness of this world toward the glory of the world to come; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

- <u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.
- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
