The Feast of the Circumcision and Name of Jesus December 31, 2023, through January 6, 2024

To know someone's name is no trivial matter. To know his name is to be able to call on him, to pick him out of a crowd, to speak to him individually. To know his name is to know that not only you know him, but *he* knows *you*—and not only knows you, but has given you his name, that you may be his friend, and speak to him. So it is no small thing when God gives us His name in the name of Jesus, before which *every knee shall bow, and every tongue confess*. That we may call upon Jesus by his name is to know that we can beseech Him in every time of need, and know that it is His pleasure to hear us, and give all that He knows we need.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

DAILY READINGS FOR THE WEEK

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY - DECEMBER 31, 2023

Theme: God gives us His name, that we may call upon it and know that He hears us, and that He gives us all that we need.

Hymn: 898, "The Ancient Law Departs"

Summary of Readings:

Numbers 6:22-27: The Lord gives the 'Aaronic blessing', by which His name shall be put upon His people.

Galatians 3:23-29: The law was given to prepare us for the coming of Christ, by whom we are justified through faith.

Luke 2:21: Our Lord is circumcised, and He is given the name Jesus.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Luke 2:21: "And at the end of eight days, when He was circumcised, He was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before He was conceived in the womb."

THE CATECHISM: THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR II

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

Where is this written? The holy Evangelists Matthew, Mark, Luke, and St. Paul write: Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night when He was betrayed, took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to the disciples and said: "Take, eat; this is My body, which is given for you. This do in remembrance of Me." In the same way also He took the cup after supper, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them saying: "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 8 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹O LORD, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! You have set your glory above the heavens. ²Out of the mouth of babes and infants, you have established strength because of your foes, to still the enemy and the avenger. ³When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, ⁴what is man that you are mindful of him, and the son of man that you care for him? ⁵Yet you have made him a little lower than the heavenly beings and crowned him with glory and honor. ⁶You have given him dominion over the works of your hands; you have put all things under his feet, ⁷all sheep and oxen, and also the beasts of the field, ⁸the birds of the heavens, and the fish of the sea, whatever passes along the paths of the seas. ⁹O LORD, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth!

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 81:

Lord Jesus, You were delivered for our offenses and raised again for our justification. Bless and defend Your Holy Church. Endue Your Word with power, strengthen our faith, and after the sufferings of this life grant us to celebrate a happy Easter, rising again to live and reign with You in all eternity. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE FEAST OF THE CIRCUMCISION AND NAME OF JESUS:

Lord God, You made Your beloved Son, our Savior, subject to the Law and caused Him to shed His blood on our behalf. Grant us the true circumcision of the Spirit that our hearts may be made pure from all sins; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

- <u>Sunday</u>: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

- <u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.
- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
