

A Guide for your Christian Life between Sundays

The Fifth Sunday in Lent March 17 through March 23, 2024

No one desires suffering. No one seeks death. Indeed, suffering and death are those two things which we fear the most. And yet, the Saints of the Church declaim their faith in their fearlessness towards death, and their calm in the midst of suffering. But the saints do not do this out of great willpower and strength. They do so because they know that Christ has transformed suffering and death, destroying their terrors, and making them into the path of Christian character and the gate of heavenly glory.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – MARCH 17, 2024

Theme: Christ has transformed suffering and death through His own suffering and death, stripping them of their power over those whom He claims as His own through His Baptism and His blood.

Hymn: 685, "Let Us Ever Walk with Jesus"

Summary of Readings:

Jeremiah 31:31–34: The Lord promises a new covenant, wherein all His people shall have His holy and righteous Law written upon their hearts.

Hebrews 5:1–10: Christ is a new high priest, superior those established under the old covenant, who intercedes on behalf of mankind before His Father in heaven.

Mark 10:35-45: The sons of Zebedee ask Jesus to be given places of honor in the Kingdom of Heaven. The Lord tells them that, though they do not know what they ask, yet nevertheless, they shall receive it. Then Jesus instructs the disciples that those who would come after Him must be as He is: a servant to all.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Mark 10:45: "For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

THE CATECHISM: THE CLOSE OF THE COMMANDMENTS II

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 119:9-16 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

⁹How can a young man keep his way pure? By guarding it according to your word. ¹⁰With my whole heart I seek you; let me not wander from your commandments! ¹¹I have stored up your word in my heart, that I might not sin against you. ¹²Blessed are you, O LORD; teach me your statutes! ¹³With my lips I declare all the rules of your mouth. ¹⁴In the way of your testimonies I delight as much as in all riches. ¹⁵I will meditate on your precepts and fix my eyes on your ways. ¹⁶I will delight in your statutes; I will not forget your word.

LUTHER'S PREFACE TO PSALM 119:9-16¹:

Beloved Father in heaven, You are blessed for granting us the Word of Your grace, in which You have revealed to us Your will concerning our salvation. Teach us to love Your Word, diligently to hear and willingly to learn it, that guided by this lamp our feet may walk in the way everlasting. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT:

Almighty God, by Your great goodness mercifully look upon Your people that we may be governed and preserved evermore in body and soul; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

<u>Sunday</u>: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

<u>Thursday</u>: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

<u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

<u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
