The Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost October 6 through October 12, 2024

It is the desire of God that man might not be alone. This is declared in the book of Genesis when the Lord institutes marriage. Yet we are narrow minded if we believe that such loneliness is cured simply by finding a good spouse, for St. Paul himself teaches us that holy marriage itself is but an image of the true mystery of Christ and the Church, of the final reconciliation of God, man, and all creation. Yet fallen man seeks only loneliness, for in it he believes he will find freedom: freedom from love, and with it, freedom from all obligation. Therefore Christ has come to accomplish what He first desired from mankind, that we not be alone, but find our completion in His love for us, and in our faith in Him and love for all His creatures.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY - OCTOBER 6, 2024

Theme: Christ has come to abolish our loneliness through the realization of His love.

Hymn: 564, "Christ Sits at God's Right Hand"

Summary of Readings:

Genesis 2:18–25: God creates woman from the rib of Adam, that she might be bone of his bone, and flesh of his flesh, a helpmeet and partner proper to him, and him to her.

Hebrews 2:1–13: In Christ, our humanity has been redeemed, and by His grace, we are made his brethren, and fellow children of God the Father.

Mark 10:2–16: Christ is tested by the Pharisees about whether a man may divorce his wife. Having silenced them, He blesses the children brought to Him, for to such as them belongs the kingdom of God.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Deuteronomy 6:4-5: "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might."

THE CATECHISM: THE 1ST COMMANDMENT

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the First Commandment? You shall have no other gods. What does this mean? We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 128 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹Blessed is everyone who fears the LORD, who walks in his ways! ²You shall eat the fruit of the labor of your hands; you shall be blessed, and it shall be well with you. ³Your wife will be like a fruitful vine within your house; your children will be like olive shoots around your table. ⁴Behold, thus shall the man be blessed who fears the LORD.

⁵The LORD bless you from Zion! May you see the prosperity of Jerusalem all the days of your life! ⁶May you see your children's children! Peace be upon Israel!

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 1281:

Thanks be to You, our God, for instituting the holy estate of matrimony and preserving it for so many ages against the assaults of that apostate spirit which is an enemy of all that is pure and godly. Make every house Your temple. Fashion the hearts of husband and wife to love children, and cause both parents and children to walk in the faith of Your Son, and be saved. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE TWENTIETH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Merciful Father, Your patience and loving-kindness toward us have no end. Grant that by Your Holy Spirit we may always think and do those things that are pleasing in Your sight; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

- <u>Sunday</u>: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

- <u>Friday</u>: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.
- <u>Saturday</u>: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
