### **Be Thou My Vision**

This medieval Irish hymn is written as a prayer of the Son to the Father; we pray this same prayer, having been united to the Son.

- 1 Be Thou my vision, O Lord of my heart; Naught be all else to me save that Thou art. Thou my best thought by day and by night; Waking or sleeping, Thy presence my light.
- 2 Be Thou my wisdom, and Thou my true Word; I ever with Thee and Thou with me, Lord. Thou my great Father, I Thy dear Son; Thou in me dwelling, and I with Thee one.

- 3 Be Thou my breastplate, my sword for the fight; Be Thou my dignity, Thou my delight. Thou my soul's shelter, Thou my high tow'r; Raise Thou me heav'nward, O Pow'r of my pow'r.
- 4 Riches I heed not, nor man's empty praise; Thou mine inheritance, now and always. Thou and Thou only, first in my heart, High King of Heaven, my treasure Thou art.
- 5 High King of Heaven, my victory won, May I reach Heaven's joys, O bright Heav'ns Sun! Heart of my own heart, whatever befall, Still be my vision, O Ruler of all.
