The Seventh Sunday after Pentecost
July 12 – July 18, 2026

The Lord preaches to us parable about the sowing of His word upon various soils, which represent our hearts. Some hearts do not receive the word, some do, but only for a time, and others embrace it. Though it is true, in the final reckoning, that some will be judged as faithful, having never accepted the word, some as weak, forever struggling with it, and some as martyrs, dying for the sake of Christ; in our lives, we all experience being ‘every kind of soil’ and having every kind of heart. Sometimes we are hard hearted, and disobedient. Sometimes we are enthusiastic about our faith, yet not steadfast. And sometimes, by the grace of our baptism, we cling to our God with our heart soul and mind. Regardless of the human weakness or the sanctified strength of our heart, the Lord sows His word into it, day by day, week by week, decade upon decade, that we may be saved.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – JUNE 12, 2026

Theme: Regardless of the state of our heart, whether we be cynical or pious, the Lord sows His word, that the full number of His children may be saved.

Hymn: 610, “Lord Jesus, Think on Me”

Summary of Readings:

Isaiah 55:10–13: The prophet Isaiah speaks of the word of God as the rain that falls from heaven, causing every living thing to grow, even as the Lord’s word causes faith to grow.

Romans 8:12–17: St. Paul instructs us to put the flesh to death, and live by the spirit, that we may suffer with Christ, and in doing so, pass this life of anguish to live with the Lord forever.

Matthew 13:1–9, 18–23: The Lord Christ preaches and explains the parable of the sower, and of the four soils.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

1 Corinthians 10:16: “The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?”

THE CATECHISM — THE SACRAMENT OF THE ALTAR (PT. 1)

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the Sacrament of the Altar? It is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, instituted by Christ Himself for us Christians to eat and to drink.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 65:9-13 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

⁹You visit the earth and water it; you greatly enrich it; the river of God is full of water; you provide their grain, for so you have prepared it. ¹⁰You water its furrows abundantly, settling its ridges, softening it with showers, and blessing its growth. ¹¹You crown the year with your bounty; your wagon tracks overflow with abundance. ¹²The pastures of the wilderness overflow, the hills gird themselves with joy, ¹³the meadows clothe themselves with flocks, the valleys deck themselves with grain, they shout and sing together for joy.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 65¹:

Father of mercy, by Your gracious Spirit guide and govern us that we may use Your spiritual and temporal gifts aright. Preserve the estates You have instituted both for the eternal salvation and the temporal welfare of mankind, and by Your mighty arm hinder and destroy that revolutionary spirit of anarchy that would subvert Your order, and keep us in Your Word. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Blessed Lord, since You have caused all Holy Scriptures to be written for our learning, grant that we may so hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
