The Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost
August 30 – September 5, 2026

St. Peter has made the great confession, that *Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God*; and for this, He is blessed. Yet having made this confession, the Lord begins to speak endlessly of His death. Peter cannot stand this, nor can He understand this, for how is it that the Son of God can die? To Peter, it seems so sudden, so new, to speak in this way. But our God has contemplated His death for the sake of the sins of man for all eternity, even as He has promised Himself to be our final sacrifice and atonement.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – AUGUST 30, 2026

Theme: The death of the Lord Jesus Christ is forever present before the eyes of God, and eternally is His sacrifice offered before the Father.

Hymn: 332, “Savior of the Nations, Come”

Summary of Readings:

Jeremiah 15:15-21: Jeremiah prays that the Lord will defend him against an unrepentant people as he suffers for the sake of preaching God’s word.

Romans 12:9-21: St. Paul exhorts all Christians to true godliness and humility; to be kind, patient, joyful, hospitable, merciful, and to, above all, not let envy, anger, vengefulness, or strife occupy our hearts and minds. Rather, we are to repay those who sin against us with love.

Matthew 16:21-28: Christ shows that He must go the way of suffering in order to accomplish redemption for mankind on the cross. He then teaches that all who would call themselves His followers too must follow Him in suffering. All who follow Christ shall have the pattern of their life conformed to that of Christ’s.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Romans 1:16a: “I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes.”

THE CATECHISM — THE 3RD COMMANDMENT

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the Third Commandment? Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word, but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 26 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹Vindicate me, O LORD, for I have walked in my integrity, and I have trusted in the LORD without wavering. ²Prove me, O LORD, and try me; test my heart and my mind. ³For your steadfast love is before my eyes, and I walk in your faithfulness. ⁴I do not sit with men of falsehood, nor do I consort with hypocrites. ⁵I hate the assembly of evildoers, and I will not sit with the wicked. ⁶I wash my hands in innocence and go around your altar, O LORD, ⁷proclaiming thanksgiving aloud, and telling all your wondrous deeds. ⁸O LORD, I love the habitation of your house and the place where your glory dwells. ⁹Do not sweep my soul away with sinners, nor my life with bloodthirsty men, ¹⁰in whose hands are evil devices, and whose right hands are full of bribes. ¹¹But as for me, I shall walk in my integrity; redeem me, and be gracious to me. ¹²My foot stands on level ground; in the great assembly I will bless the LORD.

LUTHER'S PRAYER ON PSALM 26¹:

Lord Jesus, abide with us in these latter evil days. Grant to Your Church true shepherds and faithful pastors who preach Your Word in its purity, and who lead us in the way of truth. Preserve our souls from being deluded by worldly wisdom and the teaching of men who walk after their own thoughts, and keep up steadfast in Your Word to our end. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE FOURTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

Almighty God, Your Son willingly endured the agony and shame of the cross for our redemption. Grant us courage to take up our cross daily and follow Him wherever He leads; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection among us; for the fruit of faith nourished by the Word and Sacraments.

Wednesday: Pray for marriage and family, that husbands and wives, parents and children live in ordered harmony according to the Word of God; for parents who must raise children alone; for our communities and neighborhoods.

Thursday: Pray for the Church and her pastors; for teachers, deacons, deaconesses, and other church workers; for missionaries and for all who serve the Church; for fruitful and salutary use of the blessed sacrament of Christ's body and blood.

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
