The Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost
September 6 – September 12, 2026

The disciples quarrel over who among them shall be the greatest, which is to say, who among them shall lead the Church after Christ's work on earth is completed. To this our Lord responds that the greatest shall be as a little child. But what does this mean? It is to be understood in two parts: first, that the child has nothing, but receives everything. And secondly, that the child who has received everything freely, also gives entirely freely, for having deserved nothing, he gives everything, even forgiveness, without dessert.

AN ORDER FOR DAILY MEDITATION AND PRAYER

Read the Scriptures appointed for the day, review the readings from Sunday, and learn by heart the appointed verse and portion of the Small Catechism. Conclude with the Psalms, the Collect, and the prayers, using the guidelines as you see appropriate.

A LOOK BACK TO THE LITURGY – SEPTEMBER 6, 2026

Theme: The Church is wherever the forgiveness of God is given freely to those who must be forgiven.

Hymn: 820, “My Soul, Now Praise Your Maker”

Summary of Readings:

Ezekiel 33:7-9: God appoints Ezekiel watchman for the house of Israel, entrusting him with the task of showing people their sin and God’s impending wrath, that they may turn from their sin and live.

Romans 13:1-10: The commandments may be summed up, “You shall love your neighbor as yourself.” Surely, there is no greater love for neighbor than showing them their sin and peril, that they may repent and receive forgiveness for their life and salvation.

Matthew 18:1-20: God is concerned when even a single sheep goes astray, which is why He appoints shepherds to seek and to save the lost. Surely, we may all share in this privilege of turning sinners back into God’s waiting arms by speaking His Word of warning as well as His Word of promise.

MEMORY VERSE TO LEARN BY HEART:

Proverbs 23:22: “Listen to your father who gave you life, and do not despise your mother when she is old.”

THE CATECHISM — THE 4TH COMMANDMENT

(Important! If you have memorized a different translation in confirmation, it is best to pull out your old catechism and refresh your memory from those texts.)

What is the Fourth Commandment? Honor your father and your mother.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise or anger our parents and other authorities, but honor them, serve and obey them, love and cherish them.

PSALM OF THE WEEK: PSALM 32:1-7 (ESV)

Meditate on this Psalm every day when you pray, and use it as the starting place for your own prayer:

¹Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered. ²Blessed is the man against whom the LORD counts no iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no deceit. ³For when I kept silent, my bones wasted away through my groaning all day long. ⁴For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer. ⁵I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity; I said, “I will confess my transgressions to the LORD,” and you forgave the iniquity of my sin. ⁶Therefore let everyone who is godly offer prayer to you at a time when you may be found; surely in the rush of great waters, they shall not reach him. ⁷You are a hiding place for me; you preserve me from trouble; you surround me with shouts of deliverance.

LUTHER’S PRAYER ON PSALM 32¹:

O God, our heavenly Father, with whom is grace and much forgiveness, be merciful to us who were born in sin and cannot but sin and fall short every day. Forgive us our many transgressions and account them against us no more, but make us Your heirs through Jesus Christ, Your beloved Son, who was delivered into death for our offences, and was raised again for our justification. Amen.

COLLECT FOR THE FIFTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST:

O God, from whom all good proceeds, grant to us, Your humble servants, Your holy inspiration, that we may set our minds on the things that are right and, by Your merciful guiding, accomplish them; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

DAILY THEMES FOR PRAYER – (From LSB page 294)

Friday: Pray for the preaching of the holy cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and for the spread of His knowledge throughout the whole world; for the persecuted and oppressed; for the sick and dying.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of those who are withering in the faith or have fallen away; for receptive hearts and minds to God's Word on the Lord's Day; for pastors and people as they prepare to administer and receive Christ's holy gifts.
